# Curriculum activity risk assessment **Golf**

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## Activity scope

This document relates to student participation in Golf as a curriculum activity including the teaching of golf skills, team training and competition matches conducted by schools.


## **Risk level**

- What will the students be doing?

- Who will be leading the activity?

Minimum supervision
Adequate adult supervision is to be provided. In determining what is adequate, consider the number of students, their individual needs, and the nature of the activity.
If an adult other than a registered teacher is engaged for instruction, a teacher should be present to take overall responsibility. <u>Blue Card</u> requirements <b>must</b> be adhered to.

Minimum qualifications
The qualifications listed in this section are minimums for each type of situation. Leaders are encouraged to seek training to raise their qualification level above the minimum listed.

Blue Card requirements met.
Medium — Some chance of an incident and injury requiring first aid
<ul> <li>For a registered teacher:</li> <li>A registered teacher with competence (demonstrated ability) in the teaching of golf.</li> </ul>

A teacher could demonstrate their competency to conduct an activity to the person approving the Curriculum Activity Risk Assessment through their:

knowledge of the activity and the associated hazards and risks
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experience (i.e. previous involvement) in undertaking the activity

demonstrated ability and/or expertise to undertake the activity

possession of qualifications related to the activity.

#### For a leader other than a registered teacher:

Another adult who has professional status or is in the third year of a professional traineeship or a
community accredited golf coach.

# Hazards and suggested control measures

Biological material • Body fluids (e.g. blood,	<ul> <li>Have sufficient and suitable containment material (bandages etc) readily available.</li> </ul>			
saliva, sweat)	<ul> <li>Ensure that personal items such as mouthguards, towels and drink bottles are not shared.</li> </ul>			
	• Comply with Infection Control Guideline. Students with open cuts and abrasions are to be removed from the activity and treated immediately. If bleeding cannot be controlled completely, the participant should not be allowed to return to the activity. All clothing, equipment and surfaces contaminated by blood should be treated as potentially infectious.			
Environmental conditions • Weather • Surfaces	<ul> <li>Assess weather conditions before and during the activity (e.g. temperature, storms).</li> <li>SUSPEND ALL ACTIVITIES IF LIGHTNING IS PRESENT.</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>Surrounds</li> <li>Equipment</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Assess suitability of course/range (e.g. level, debris, potholes/divots in ground) before and during activity.</li> </ul>			
	Check equipment before use.			
	• The hitting range should be located away from other activities for practice sessions. It is recommended that the area be approximately 120 metres wide and 250 metres long.			
	<ul> <li>Site activities away from buildings, pedestrians and other activities.</li> </ul>

<ul><li>Equipment</li><li>Clubs</li></ul>	• Check clubs frequently for smooth grips, loose heads and shaft irregularities. Where necessary, they should be repaired or replaced before further use.			
Fast moving objects • Balls	• Ensure that there is three metres of clear space between students striking the ball.			
Clubs	<ul> <li>Establish and use verbal and/or whistle commands to signal students to start hitting, cease hitting and retrieve golf balls.</li> </ul>			
	• Retrieve all golf balls at the same time.			
	<ul> <li>Leave clubs in hitting area when retrieving balls.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>Position left-handed golfers on the right-hand side of the group.</li> </ul>			
	Give students a target area at which to drive.			
<ul> <li>Physical exertion</li> <li>Strains and sprains</li> <li>Cramps</li> <li>Exhaustion and fatigue</li> </ul>	Have appropriate warm-up and warm-down activities.			
	<ul> <li>Follow progressive and sequential skills development.</li> </ul>			
	• Have ice packs available.			
	<ul> <li>Continuously monitor students for signs of fatigue and exhaustion.</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>Students</li> <li>Student numbers and control – adequate adult</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Refer to Individual Education Plan/Educational Adjustment Plan/Behaviour Management Plan and other student documents.</li> </ul>			
supervision <ul> <li>Special needs</li> <li>High risk</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Obtain parental permission, including relevant medical information.</li> </ul>			
<ul><li>behaviours</li><li>Medical conditions</li></ul>	• Jewellery can be a serious hazard when undertaking many activities. All forms of jewellery should be considered in terms of the risk it presents for each activity. Procedures should be put in place to ban, dissuade or protect (e.g. tape) the wearing of jewellery accordingly.			
	Ensure systems are in place to monitor student numbers.
